Turf and Toilet



The California Department of Water Resources announced two new rebate programs to help Californians replace inefficient toilets and remove water-guzzling lawns by replacing them with landscapes requiring little water.

The "turf and toilet" rebate program is financed by the Proposition 1 Water Bond approved by voters in 2014.

The program includes a \$100 consumer rebate for replacing one old toilet per household and a \$2.00 per square foot rebate for replacing lawns (up to \$2,000).

While not readily available, it is anticipated that Centerville customers will be eligible for the turf rebate after October 1, 2015.

SHASCOM 9-1-1

SHASCOM 9-1-1, the county-wide 9-1-1 center, has recently purchased **CODE RED**, an emergency citizen notification system for cell phones. Once you register your cell phone number, you will be able to receive emergency public safety warnings and alerts on behalf of law enforcement, the fire department and public health. These messages are critical community alerts which can include missing child reports, evacuation notices and other emergency notifications.

Did you cut your landline and now only have cell service? If so, SHASCOM will NOT be able to reach you unless you register. To register your cell phone, go to the SHASCOM 9-1-1 website, www.shascom911.com, and choose "Citizen Notification" near the top of the page. You can also access the links from the District's website. While registering you can choose to either receive a text or a voice message. TDD/TTY devices (telephones for the hearing impaired) may also be registered. You do not need to register your landline phone, as this data is already in the SHASCOM 9-1-1 system.



THE VALUE OF WATER

One-fifth of the US economy would grind to a halt without a reliable and clean source of water.

Water connects us. Water is a ride on a boat with friends, a sprinkler making children laugh with joy and the soothing cup of tea after a long day. Water brings families and friends together in countless ways. 61% percent of Americans rely on lakes, rivers, and streams as their source of drinking water. The other 39% rely on groundwater—water located underground in aquifers and wells.
